Our rallying year hasn't got off to a very good start with Mells too wet for us to get in the field, Lambourn and the Gartel, events cancelled we were really looking forward to the Shillingstone Rally and pulled into the event on Friday prior to the Show. What we did not reckon on was a whole days worth of rain on Saturday which started to churn the field up. To try and ease the situation the organisers cancelled the Ring Events and Tractor pulling and after a few more heavy showers on Sunday the decision was made to call the show off. What a shame there was so much to see, all the Vintage Vehicle classes were all well attended and a large Stall section, much of which remained sheeted down. So by midday on Sunday we made our downhill journey towards the exit, trying to judge where there was a gap in the outgoing exodus so as not to stop in the mud. Our Stationary Engine Simon did a great job looking after us all (approximately 100 exhibits), as he had to relocate the display from its usual location.

What a change in conditions when we attended the Selwood Rally the following weekend. Everyone went home with a suntan or sunburn as the Saturday and Sunday were really hot. This must have been Selwood's biggest show ever, so much to see, the full size steam engines must have been close to a dozen and our section was supported by some very nice exhibits. But the Gremlins struck next to me when Pete Gear's 8hp Ruston devolved a fuel leak and despite help from mate Gordon, it could not be fixed on the field so after a quick trip back home a replacement Blackstone was installed, which ran like a dream and never missed a beat in three days. Generating John was on the other side of me with his 1940's lighting set which ran faultless all weekend. We did enjoy a couple of visits to the WW2 Tea Tent, with all its décor it look you back some 70 years as a reminder of how things were then. Older Club Members will recognise the following names visiting the show, Tony Jones, Ian Skuse and Phil Riley, it was great to have a chat with them all. On Saturday a large Car Boot took place just outside the show and I did find an interesting bit of kit here, in fact it was so heavy I had to put it down 10 times carrying it back to the field. (I did try and get Jackie to move it for a bit but she could not even get it off the ground!) So to sum up this was one of the best Selwood events ever, made all the better by being sun drenched, well done to all them and their helpers.

### Making a Windsor Chair- Part 1 - - - By Jeremy Adams

Editor: This was written by a Member some time ago and for some reason it never got put in. Jeremy obviously took some time to write it and it will have to be part 1 and Part 2 next month - but just to show we do appreciate all your input - Thank you Jeremy.

When asked what I wanted for my birthday I replied 'a chair making course' and so it was, Axminster Power Tools offer several courses in their Skills centre at Sittingbourne, and at Axminster. The Windsor Chair course is a full 5 days, and no prior knowledge is necessary, but practical skills obviously help. I have some woodworking skills, having been a school technician and also skills of the DIY variety.

The course can take up to 6 people at time, although there were only 4 of us on this occasion, the minimum to run. Each day is a full 09.00 to 17.00, a buffet lunch is provided and as much tea or coffee as you can drink.

After introducing ourselves to each other and the staff tutors it was down to business. The first item was a chat on safety, the workshop facilities, fire alarms etc. Then we each selected a 2" thick slab of wood to form the seat out of. We were introduced to the Arbotec, an angle grinder with a rotating disc with teeth. We had previously marked out the centre line and various other markings to determine where the legs are. There are no straight lines or 90° angles on this type of chair, so everything is referred back to the centre line. The Arbotec is offered to the seat with a stroking action which produces a blizzard of wood chips. Later a less harsh cutter is used, and finally an abrasive wheel, The eventual outcome is two rough depressions in the seat top. Next, with the seat fixed to the bench with the wedges, a riving knife is used together with a spoke shave, a small plane and other planing type tools, until the depression shapes match your shape. This was done by placing the work on the top of a workshop stool and sitting down on it. Most of the first day was taken up with the seat. Once the final shape was reached we used a scraper and abrasive papers to get the best finish we could, as time would allow.

We were introduced to the wood lathe at this stage and after a demonstration by the tutor, we got a practice piece to try out. As with a lot of things it is not as easy as it looks. We gradually gained in confidence however. I should add here there were plenty of tools and machines available so there was no waiting around for a lathe etc. We then had to decide the design for the leg turnings. I wanted to match my existing dining chairs at home so put one in the car to copy. There were lots of examples available if you got stuck, and three completed chairs available to look at. A leg is one thing but making another three to match is another. The sizing was by using a ruler, and callipers to compare the legs with the number 1 leg so they were all the same. There was a whole range of different wood turning tools available, and we had to learn what each was for. The top end of each leg has to be a specific size as a snug fit in the hole drilled for it under the seat. Whilst on the subject of drilling, various holes are required in the parts both blind, and right through. In order to make the project repeatable the tutors had spent many hours making and adjusting specials jigs for drilling and bending operations. Without this facility we should have struggled to complete the chair in the time available. At this point the seat was drilled underneath for the legs, and on top for the side and back spindles using the various jigs.
